**Fill in the blank with the Korean word that best completes the sentence.**

- 1) When the instructor says Charyut (Attention), we stand still with our feet together and our hands at our sides.
- 2) When the instructor says Kyung-Net (Bow), we bow and say “Tae Kwon.”
- 3) Joon-Bee (Ready) means stand in ready stance.
- 4) When we enter the Do-Jang (Taekwon-do School), we must take off our shoes before stepping on the mat.
- 5) We always wear a Do-Bok (Taekwon-do Uniform) to train. The color of our belt signifies our level of training.
- 6) Sah-Bum-Nim means Instructor.
- 7) Kwnag-Jang-Nim means Grand Master.

**Indicate the order of rank by numbering the belts, starting with #1 for white belt.**

- 1 **WHITE** signifies innocence, a beginning student who has no previous knowledge of Taekwon-do.
- 5 **RED** signifies danger, cautioning the student to exercise control and warning the opponent to stay away.
- 3 **GREEN** signifies the plant growth as the Taekwon-do skills begin to develop.
- 2 **YELLOW** signifies Earth, from which a plant sprouts and takes root as Taekwon-do foundation is laid.
- 6 **BLACK** is a combination of all the colors, therefore, signifies the maturity and proficiency in Taekwon-do. Also indicates the wearer's imperviousness to darkness and fear.
- 4 **BLUE** signifies the Heaven towards which the plant matures into a towering tree as training Taekwon-do progresses.
